SEM Chapter Chair Message

This was a great year for the Southeastern Mass. Chapter. In addition to our usual social activities (Winter Festival, Spring Fling, Summer Picnic and Annual Dinner) and outdoor offerings, we offered SOLO wilderness first-aid training and two leadership training sessions, one of which was designed for our Cape leaders. Two projects using AMC supplemental dues were approved and completed. We purchased a new computer for our membership chair who is now online. We also provided additional funding for Lonesome Lake trail work in May and September. Most of our goals for 2000 were achieved:

- We expanded our leadership program using our own resources, and more leaders were trained. We sent two of our leaders to AMC Mountain Leadership School.
- More backpacking trips were offered this past summer - an intermediate winter hiking series has been scheduled for this winter.
- The format of the Southeast Breeze was modified to include special articles and features.

Although we established some contact with local colleges and universities, we hope to do more next year to attract younger members. We reaffirmed our commitment to the three sections of the Lonesome Lake Trail that we have adopted and maintained for over 20 years.

The Executive Board had a busy and productive year. We filled all but one vice-chair position. We developed functions and responsibility descriptions for all board positions to help incoming board members and to assist future nominating committees in recruiting board members. We developed a policy statement and accounting form for chapter trips where fees are charged. Our work in this area led

to a club-wide review with many chapters developing similar policies. We closed out a special account held by AMC for many years and moved it to a short-term certificate of deposit with a higher rate of return. Our chapter website moved this year to a location with its own registered name: www.amcsem.org. Planning is underway for a special 25th Anniversary Annual Meeting in 2001, which will be held at the BR Monponsett Inn in Halifax.

Finally, I want to thank Board members and everyone who helped make our activities happen. Without the dedication and enthusiasm of many, we would not have had our many activity offerings. However, we can always use more volunteers so that we are not always depending on the same people all the time. Some of the ways you can get involved are serving on a planning committee, doing volunteer trail work, helping out at a social function, leading activities or serving on the Executive Board or Nominating Committee. The more you put into your club, the more benefit you will receive from it. So come on out and get involved!

Canoe and Kayak

October marks the "official" year-end for paddling, but a warm day and quiet winds will sometimes bring out enthusiasts for "just another" trip. Potluck planning meetings and trips were held both on- and off-Cape in an effort to reach new participants, and a few new paddlers were added. Again, kayaks seem to be more numerous on most trips, but canoes remain popular for trips through narrow brushy rivers with quick turns and the longer trips where more gear is needed.



Two Training/Safety sessions were held: Kayak on May 14 at the heated Sandwich HS Pool, directed by Bill Low and assisted by Dick Coveny and Bob Slott; plus a June 25 Beginners Canoe Day in Ashumet Pond led by Dave Shephard.

Two trips were scheduled weekly from the end of March through the end of Oct. Potlucks were offered occasionally and the Moonlight Evening Potluck and Paddle was offered again by Carrie Dobson. There were three longer, "wilderness" trips, including Dave Shephard's Connecticut River Trip, and one to Knubble Bay, thanks to Dave Shephard, Dave Williams and Art Hart, who also offered another trip in the Adirondacks of up-state New York.

Many regulars led trips, but a few stand out: Al Johnson, 7 trips; Art Hart, 5, including the wilderness trips; Dave Williams for Co-Chairing and for leading regular and wilderness trips; Max Sarazin for many trips and record-keeping over the years; Nancy Wigley for extra time helping with the scheduling/obtaining leaders as well as leading trips; Dave Shephard for being "a stalwart supporter" of the program, as well as for leading a number and variety of trips, including three wilderness trip; Dick Coveny, who not only led trips he signed on for, but also filled in a few times when a leader had to cancel at the last minute. Hiking and Backpacking

The 2000 season was a banner year for hiking and backpacking. This in spite of a very wet spring and summer. The Hiking Committee produced a total of 63 hikes this year, including 35 local hikes with 355 participants and 28 northern mountain hikes with 272 hikers participating. Six of these hikes were backpacking trips. The total number of people taking advantage of our hiking program was 627.

Once again, the Hiking Committee offered a beginner level Winter Hiking Program. Over 30 people attended the Winter Hiking Workshop, which was held on November 13, 1999. All of the five subsequent hikes were filled beyond capacity.

The Hiking Committee also trained and qualified 14 new leaders this year. As described in the SEM/AMC Hike Leadership Requirements developed last year, leaders are required to take the Leadership Program produced by the Education Chair, and to co-lead varying numbers and types of hikes to qualify to lead different levels of hikes.

The highlight of the 2000 hiking season was Chapter Hut Night, held on October 14-15 at Mizpah Spring Hut in Crawford Notch, NH. Twenty-eight people participated in this event, which featured hikes to and over Mt. Eisenhower, Mt. Pierce and Mt. Jackson.

Cape Hikes

Local Cape Hikes maintains a regular hiking program that enjoys continuing participation. Hikes are usually on Cape acreage with an occasional meander over the bridge. The Cape hiking season runs traditionally from September to May with the recent inclusion of two summer full-moon hikes. The final hike in May shares a gourmet picnic lunch on shore with canoe and kayak members.

Thursday and Sunday shorter hikes, numbering around 70 annually, draw an average of 15 to 25 participants, with the greater number attending on Sundays. Longer Cape Hikes on Saturday and Sunday will continue to be scheduled once or twice monthly. Tentative Spring plans are for off-Cape excursions to the Blue Hills and beyond for day hiking.

In previous years, two or three coordinators planned the hikes and submitted them for publication. The intensive and ever-increasing work of hike planning is now done by the Cape Hikes Committee and hike leaders. Established June 2000, the Committee shares among its members the tasks of planning the hiking program. Current members of the Cape Hikes Committee are Janet Kaiser; Chair; Janet DiMattia, Co-Chair; Blanche Greig, Secretary; Peter Selig, Education; and Paula Mayer, Communications.

Committee planning meetings are now held 5 times annually (on the first Tuesday of Feb., Apr., June, Oct. and Dec.) in the afternoon and are open to all members. Please contact Janet Kaiser (375-0574) or Janet DiMattia (394-9064) for meeting time and location.



On September 16, Leadership Training was conducted on the Cape by Bob Vogel and Steve Tulip of the SEM Education Committee, who joined Cape Hikes Committee members Peter Selig and Janet Kaiser to present the program of lectures and role-play scenarios.
