We continue to produce quality events for our members. Along with our many Cape hikes and paddles, we offer a large selection of local hikes throughout the Southeast Massachusetts area as well as our White Mountain hiking/backpacking trips. Our cycling group has 19 people registered in the 2000-Mile Club. Conservation and trails continue to get the public out and involved in their local environment. Our education committee has trained 16 new potential leaders this year and 20 leaders have completed Wilderness First Aid to make our outdoor events safer for all involved. Our chapter continues to remain fiscally sound. We have set up a reserve fund and invested it with the well-managed, AMC Joy St. funds.

Over the past year, we have partnered with several other outdoors-oriented organizations. These include L.L. Bean, which provided us with space in front of their new store in Mansfield during their grand opening where we were able to promote our

club. We also formed associations with the Lloyd Center for Environmental studies, The Taunton River Watershed Alliance, the U-Mass Dartmouth Outing Club, and the Massachusetts Great Parks Pursuit.

In conclusion, I feel our chapter is in great shape. The new board is anxious to get going with new ideas and more events for the coming year. It has been an honor to serve this chapter. I wish the new board members the best and urge every one in the chapter to help out in any way you feel appropriate.

This winter, we initiated a partnership with the Taunton River Watershed Association (TRWA) to further our common goals. This provides TRWA members with an opportunity to get out and enjoy SEM events within the watershed, and AMC members with an opportunity to participate in TRWA events and gain knowledge about the Taunton River watershed.

At the request of Mike Gildesgame, the AMC's Southern New England policy manager, the chapter started identifying areas in Southeast Mass. as possible Critical Treasures. We recommended ten areas and we've been asked to provide greater detail on eight of these. Many thanks to Bill Ruel, Jim Plouffe, John Gould, and other folks who took time to contribute their thoughts and suggestions.

We led two conservation outings during the SEM-sponsored Spring Gathering. Bill Ruel provided a wonderful walk along the Cape Cod Canal and up Sagamore Hill. Nancy Wigley had the Four Pond Conservation Area parking lot in Pocasset filled well beyond capacity for her wonderful interpretive nature walk. I am regularly impressed with the knowledge and skills of AMC members.

Once again this year, we ran a Foul Meadows birding outing and a tour of the North Attleboro National Fish Hatchery.

We also ran a nature walk during the Summer Picnic at the Lloyd Center in Dartmouth again this year. This is a fantastic facility with great natural history exhibits set in a beautiful location.

Thanks to the AMC staff and SEM members for all the suggestions, assistance and opportunities provided this year. I look forward to learning and achieving a higher standard next year.

The 2008 season also offered a backpacking series to Western Massachusetts and Vermont as well as an AT series that focused on Western Mass. We also offered many local hikes in southeastern part of the state. The Fall

Our leaders led three hikes during our annually Chapter Hut Night, hosted by the good folks at AMC Cold River Camp in Evans Notch. The pinnacle trip was a circle over the Baldfaces, which offered a unique above tree line experience.

Paddling

The canoe/kayak group held two scheduling meetings this year, one in January and one in early April. From these meetings, we scheduled a total of 63 trips running from the beginning of April to the end of October.

This was big year with a total of 46 trips and 501 paddlers; an increase of 59 paddlers over last year. Ten trips were also cancelled because of the weather forecast. There were a total of 19 different leaders on the trips and we have seven trips still to run this month before the scheduled season closes. Some paddlers will continue through the winter months but their trips will only be announced via the short notice list. In January, we held a kayak rescue and recovery session for eight paddlers at the Hyannis YMCA pool. The session was excellent and two new leaders were qualified during the session. They both led trips during the season.

We will start off the new season with a scheduling meeting in December to set up the early trips from April through June.
